The exhibit is a story about drugs, told from a pharmacists point of view.

The aim with the exhibit is to give you a trace to the humanity's incessant searching for new and better drugs against our illnesses and pain.


It is, of course, impossible to show all drugs and their use. I have chosen my most important and appropriate wide range of philatelic items to illustrate the story and some selected drugs.

Most of the drugs for a very long time were claimed to be used against nearly every disease. But the ingredients were often secret, the effect was usually doubtful and unproved. and some may even be harmful.

The scientific and industrial revolution created a lot of new drugs. Pre-packed drugs sold "over-the-counter", without a doctors prescription, flourished and were announced without inhibitions. An example is "Chok Marafet" Cure.

But useful "modern" drugs were developed. An example is Aspirin (containing acetylsalicylic acid): one of the most widely used drugs in the world, now mainly used to prevent blood clots.

Drugs contribute to the increase of life expectancy. But in spite of innovations the traditional medicine have got a new era, and you will see that the story ends like it started and it will never end!




But be careful! Many people believe that traditional drugs have no side effects. The Common Earth Smoke (Fumaria officinalis), used to treat skin and eye diseases and to cleanse the kidney, may be poisonous because of its alkaloids. It should only be used under the direction of a medical herbalist.







The plant ("Round-leaved Wintergreen") is used in urinary bladder disorders, against painful urination, boils and infected wounds.


