

Bayazid Turkish transit office temporary replacing Julfa

During the 1907 constitutional crisis this little used transit post office in Turkey close to the Persian border for mail from north western part of Azarbadjan in Persia replaced the normal route via Julfa

Persian registration in m/s No 115. Turkish registration mark applied on front. Rare combination

Letter from Khoy in North wwestern Persia 10 March 1907 to Paris via Bayazid Turkish transit postmark and Konstantinople transit 1 April
